This year we had a record number of applicants that was over 50 total interested persons. After a long and thorough interview process we officially hired a Crew Lead and three (3) crew members to fill out the team this year.

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## THIS MONTH'S **TOP STORIES**

The season officially started for the trail crew on 5/13/24. We immediately got to work getting qualifications up to date which included getting First Aid / CPR, Crosscut, and Chainsaw Certifications. The crew then got to work on our beloved Central Oregon Trails which are highlighted below:



### Scott Pass - Crosscut Certifications & Drainages


The saw certifications saw us getting on to the Scott Pass Trail to clear the very limited blow down from the winter while getting all Crosscut Certifications updated. While we were up there we also took advantage of the time to clear some drains and brush out the trail where overcrowding of saplings was taking place. This opportunity gave the crew a

good chance to bond while taking the long drive up and also helped us learn to communicate with each other by discussing what needed to be done while being certified. Additionally, we were able to split into different groups throughout the day to better get to know each other and how we communicate.



#### Suttle Lake Reroutes

The Crew with the help of DNF Trail Program got to work on the Suttle Lake reroutes completing three (3) separate sections of reroutes to help make the trail more sustainable. These reroutes saw the trail move from the waters edge up hill slightly which will help with erosion concerns and also provides a new view of the lake. Included in the work was a lot of tread work / removal of saplings and downed trees while punching in new trail. The Crew then also decommissioned the old trail by filling in with debris and installing assurance markers to indicate where the trail was after the reroute. Additionally, the crew repaired a retaining wall that has been battered by waves over the years to reinforce the tread where the trail was not rerouted. Trail crew was able to achieve over several hundred feet of new trail that should be more sustainable moving forward.



## Camp Sherman H-Loop Reroute

Trail Crew got to work on making a connector trail between the Camp Sherman trail and the Lower Black Butte trail. This process included laying out flagging by our Crew Lead Josie which then she and the Crew created new tread to connect the two trails. The reroute incorporated an old trail/road that was utilized at points that made sense but also takes the hiker through some big beautiful Ponderosa trees. Josie was quick to ensure that the new tread avoided a large snag while creating a slowly meandering trail for maximum enjoyment. Additionally, the crew did an excellent job of decommissioning parts of the old

trail/road to make it clear to where the trail was intended to go. Lastly, the crew moved some signposts and installed some carsonite to ensure that the trails were appropriately marked.

#### Odds & Ends

- The Trail Crew was able to attend the virtual DTC Steering Committee Meeting to gain a better perspective of all the great work our organization does for Central Oregon.
- In addition to the work mentioned above the trail crew also:
  - Staged debris at Meadow Camp for a future <u>High Desert Climbing Alliance</u> work party.
  - Worked on correcting the outslope and drainages at Tumalo Falls.
  - Jason helped plan the TKO Chainsaw Training Class (to be held 6/4 6/7)
    which Sam will be attending.
  - Jason helped plan the National Trails Day Events (to be held 6/1) which couldn't have been done without the help from Group Leaders that graciously offered their assistance.
